


North East Area Action Plan


All areas of deprivation as identified by the [Department of Communities and Local Government](#):

- Living Environment



Domain Maps of deprivation based on the identified priorities:


Health & Disability

The members of the North East Area Committee and supporting officers will pursue actions in line with these priorities throughout the year. Groups and projects working to alleviate deprivation in any of the 7 domains or in line with the aims outlined in the Corporate Plan can be considered by the Committee for support.

Before being considered for application, projects for the benefit of Ipswich residents, but not identified here, must first make the case for local benefit at a Committee meeting.

** Index of Multiple Deprivation ranking is calculated by combining seven domain scores, using the following weights: Income (22.5%), Employment (22.5%), Health and Disability (13.5%), Education, Skills and Training (13.5%), Barriers to Housing and Services (9.3%), Crime (9.3%), Living Environment (9.3%). The higher the score the more deprived the area.*

The North East Area Committee will seek to further the aims of the Council in improving the town for residents as described in BUILDING A BETTER IPSWICH: THE COUNCIL'S CORPORATE PLAN.

For 2017-18 the North East Area Committee will prioritise action in line with the following aims and activities;

Underlying Principle 1: A Fairer Ipswich

Everything we do will be based on the principles of fairness and participation. We will work to eliminate discrimination, promote equality of opportunity, and foster good relations amongst all the people of Ipswich.

Priority 2: A Sustainable Environment

We recognise that a high quality environment is key to the success of the town's economy and the health and wellbeing of our residents.

Priority 4: A Healthy Community

We will contribute to the quality of life for Ipswich residents and aim to influence the health and wellbeing of local people.

Priority 6: Safe Communities

We will work with partners to tackle community safety issues in the town.

The North East Area Committee is committed to engagement with the community it serves. It has therefore based these priorities for action on feedback from residents at public meetings and events, such as the North East Area Committee meeting.

July 2017	<p>Summer Holiday Activity Programme</p> <p>A summer holiday programme was funded to increase physical activity levels in young people (primarily 13-18 year olds) by offering local and free to access activities across the town. The programme also aims to introduce young people into sport that can lead to regular activity after the holidays. July 2017	<p>Inspire Suffolk Sport & Media Youth Programme</p> <p>Inspire Suffolk has been secured £562,476 of funding for a three year programme of sports and media based learning and mentoring at the Lindbergh Centre, supported by Ipswich Community Media. July 2017	<p>Ipswich & Suffolk West Indian Association Lunch Club</p> <p>Ipswich and Suffolk West Indian Association provides a weekly Lunch Club and other sociable and informative events to meet the needs of the older generation of the Caribbean community in Ipswich. September 2017	<p>'It's Tuesday' Conversational English Group</p> <p>Funding was awarded to Ipswich Town of Sanctuary to enable them to continue to offer English tuition for speakers of other languages at the class held at St John's URC. The grant will be spent on marketing materials, electronic tablets, improved Wi-Fi and remuneration for two specialist teaching staff over 2 years. £4,720 awarded.</p>	<p>Priorities: Education, Skills & Training, A Fairer Ipswich</p>

November 2017	<p>Suffolk Libraries Local at Ransomes Pavilion Suffolk Libraries Local is a new and cost-effective way of delivering the library service in places without a branch library. A portable library is set up each week for 3-4 hours in a community venue, and like a branch library, there is a range of activities on offer such as Baby Bounce, Lego Club and Knit and Natter. A collection of books is available for loan and portable IT devices to enable customers to access the internet. The sessions also provide people with opportunities for social interaction and are a key source of signposting and support.
